CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2019

Tena koutou katoa.

I have the privilege of writing this on behalf of my fellow trustees, Eric Shackleton and Jack Rogers. Together with our General Manager and her management team, and Eddie Aickin our long serving Secretary and Financial Advisor, we have continued to work together to try to meet the Aged Care needs of our community.

These, as we all live longer, carrying with us increasing demand, and to maintain financial viability. For several years now, near maximal occupancy has been achieved. This demands excellent organisation and commitment from all of our staff and liaison with our community health workers and hospital. In spite of this, there have been times when members of our community who may have spent most of their lives in the True Far North (Taitokerau) and needing urgent admission, have not been able to be accommodated, and have had to be admitted to other aged care facilities. This is obviously distressing for the person concerned and their families and friends owing to the resulting geographical isolation. Our waiting list continues to grow, and the need for assessments of our elderly to allow planning of appropriate care mounts.

For some years, we have had a draft plan for another 20 bed wing to provide both residential and hospital categories of care, and the need for this wing is obviously now. The estimated cost is \$3 million. We are considering new ways of collaborating with both Government and other organisations to enable this to happen. There is no magic wand, but we remain optimistic.

Currently, we have our architect of longstanding drawing up a draft plan for the residential village on the properties acquired by the Trust (largely through generous bequests from members of our community). We envisage that this will contain both rental and right to occupy (a form of ownership for life) units in keeping with our community profile and needs. It is difficult to envisage at this stage how this will be funded. We are exploring opportunities for collaboration with other like-minded organisations.

We pride ourselves on the quality of care we provide and strive to make this care personal and not institutional. We pay great tribute to our General Manager, Jackie Simkins, her management team and all of the Staff of the CSMT. Jackie has lead our staff for 21 years. She has decided to retire in November and will be sorely missed. On behalf of the Trust Board, our residents, their families, and our community for whom I know I can speak too, we thank Jackie for her leadership, vision, empathy and – often sacrificial – commitment to the 'Home on South Road'. We wish her and husband Alan a happy fulfilling retirement on their slice of paradise in Takahue.

I am very pleased to announce that we have employed a new GM, Tina Mills. We aimed high, and look forward to you all getting to know her.

Lastly, we wish to thank our community for their continuing support. The CSMT Auxiliary deserve special mention for all the time they give in making a difference to the lives of our residents. The 'Home on South Road' belongs to you all, and we hope will be there to meet our needs as the journey continues!

GENERAL MANAGER

Some time ago someone called me Mrs Switzer, I thought then, it's time I retired!!

It has been an honour and a privilege to have led the team who have shared the care of the older people in our community. I can honestly say that I have never been bored. There have been a raft of changes, significant growth and many challenges to overcome during my 21 year tenure. However, the important thing to remember is, that it was a lovely place when I arrived and it will be a lovely place when I leave, albeit different.

Governance of the Trust has always been in safe hands and together the Trustees, manager, staff, volunteers and the community will continue to make improvements. Switzer will go from strength to strength. The home is a community asset and it is my hope is that it will always remain so. I wish the new General Manager Tina Mills well in her new role.

Of all the initiatives that I have been a part of introducing, I think that the Eden Alternative has had the most positive impact on the lives and wellbeing of both residents and staff. It is the initiative I think that the team should be most proud of. In October we had a visit from the 'Eden auditors' and we achieved another 2 of the 10 principles, leaving just 3 more to complete until Switzer becomes a fully Edenised home. Well done to <u>everyone</u>, residents, staff, volunteers and Trustees.

The Eden Alternative makes us think outside the clinical and financial aspects of the services we provide. It makes us look more carefully at the person, and what the individual needs. Loving companionship; family, friends, animals and the environment; trees, plants and flowers. Having the opportunity to give to others and to help ourselves, the right to be in control and make decisions and to have some spontaneity and variety in our life. It's not rocket science, but often forgotten when we get into the medical model of care. 'Eden thinking' has stimulated huge change at Switzer in the last 5 years, some examples follow:

Making new friends can seem more challenging as we age, but by introducing a number of different groups we have discovered that shared interests coupled with a desire to contribute to the community helps close connections to flourish. It's great to have the companionship of friends whilst doing something worthwhile. Our knitting group often knit useful items of clothing to give to the hospital for the new-borns or to raise funds for the care of our animals, vet bills and food. Knitting is a dying art, perhaps next year our residents could visit local schools and teach the children how to knit.

At Switzer, we use music therapy in a number of different ways. Music touches a chord within us that resonates with our heart, mind and spirit. From the soothing sound of a lullaby to songs that mark significant life events, music creates the soundtrack to our busy lives. Through music comes reminiscence, social connection and feelings of belonging and wellbeing.

Recently we received a generous grant from the Mangonui Masonic Lodge to assist us with the cost of introducing aromatherapy and massage. Aromatherapy can reduce anxiety and agitation, it can promote relaxation and sleep and feelings of calmness. It has the potential for reduction in the use of medications. The initiative has already had some success.

As residents have become more in control of their lives, having choices, and making decisions that affect them and the environment, we have found that many of those who are able are visiting their friends to have a chat, or just to say goodnight. They are also extending a hand of friendship to new residents to ease their transition into their new home. At Switzer we welcome school children of all ages, from pre-school to college. Embracing friendships across generations has tremendous benefits that all participants receive regardless of age and there is the potential for genuine connections to be formed. The children often present tributes to the residents such as a painting, craft work, a poem or even a song.

When we think about **Creature Comforts**, from cuddly kittens to horses, every home should have daily interactions with animals both great and small, they bring immense comfort and joy to our residents. Whilst everyone can benefit from these moments, for people living with dementia the positive impact can be very significant. Studies have shown that interacting with animals produces a marked decrease in feelings of tension, fatigue and confusion and can help to ease the stress of social interaction for people living with dementia. Just a few minutes of connecting with an animal triggers an amazing reaction in the body which lowers the stress hormone cortisol, and increases the feel-good hormone, serotonin. There really is science behind that warm and fuzzy feeling!

Such good things!! Switzer is a vibrant and lovely place.

I am confident that the cultural change that has come about at Switzer through the introduction of the Eden Alternative, will continue. It doesn't end, we just get better and better.

My thanks to the residents, staff, volunteers, Switzer Home Auxiliary, the Trustees and the wider team and community for an interesting, challenging and satisfying 21 year journey, I have learned so much. Go well.

TRAINING CO-ORDINATOR

Where did 2019 go? Christmas in just over 5 weeks – unbelievable.

On the training front again it's been another very busy and varied year. Between January and the end of October there were 916 staff participations in training activities. In addition to this number are all the staff undertaking various Careerforce New Zealand Level 3 and Level 4 qualifications.

16 external educators conducted training in Switzer this year.

There were 45 paid staff participations in external training courses, either in Kaitaia, Kerikeri, Whangarei or Auckland.

Webinars have been used to deliver in-house training to specific target groups. Mandatory education continues to be delivered during "Make It Happen Day", competency training, and self-directed learning questionnaires.

A number of excellent MOOC (Massive Open Online Courses) have been completed by staff during 2019. To staff who haven't yet tried one...have a go. Remember, the courses are free. Check the notice boards for details. There are also many other high quality free on-line learning options available. A list of some of them can be found on the notice board in the staff room.
